

Dr Laura CAMFIELD: Laura Camfield currently works as a Qualitative Research Fellow with *Young Lives* (Oxford University), a long-term international research project investigating the changing nature of childhood poverty. She previously coordinated the WeD research in South and Northeast Thailand, and was responsible for the theme of Subjective Wellbeing (or Quality of Life). She is also co-authoring the Thai Country Book, which brings together data from three years of fieldwork (provisional title 'Understanding wellbeing in contemporary Thailand'). Her research interests include: Wellbeing & poverty in contemporary Thailand; Quality of life and subjective wellbeing, specifically how people characterise living well or a 'good life'; Qualitative and quantitative methodologies, including creation and use of measures and participatory research; and Chronic illness, disability, and HIV/AIDS.

Dr Monica GUILLEN ROYO: Monica Guillen Royo is Research Officer at the Department of Social and Policy Sciences and the Wellbeing in Developing Countries ESRC Research Group (WeD) at the University of Bath, UK. Her PhD thesis on Consumption and wellbeing used data sets generated by the WeD group together with her own fieldwork in Peru to explore consumption patterns, motives to consume specific goods, and whether this enhances consumers' wellbeing, both subjective and objective. Her research interests include the theoretical debate on subjective and objective wellbeing; patterns of consumption and basic needs satisfaction; poverty and consumption; mixed methods; inter-disciplinary approaches in the social sciences and issues around globalisation and development.
